
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Introduction


Findings

Of the 31 Emergency Departments and 11 Injury Units, only

17 have dedicated MSWs



Currently there is limited education or training on raising awareness or the management of DSGBV in EDs and IUs.



Outcomes

Next Steps

- Members of the Collaborative are working with TUSLA to support the rolling out
 - of awareness and training nationally for DSGBV.
- Different levels of training dependent on roles/responsibility will be provided
- Training modules will include how to RECOGNISE, RESPOND, REFER and give note

to SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS for patient needs in relation to DSGBV.
